Special Guest Speakers



Pedro Antonio Noguera, Ph.D.

Pedro Noguera is the Peter L. Agnew Professor of Education at New York University. He holds tenured faculty appointments in the departments of Teaching and Learning and Humanities and Social Sciences at the Steinhardt School of Culture, Education and Development at NYU. He is also the Executive Director of the Metropolitan Center for Research on Equity and the Transformation of Schools. Dr. Noguera is the author of eight books and over 150 articles and monographs. His most recent books are “Schooling for Resilience: Improving the Life Trajectory of African American and Latino Boys,” “Creating the Opportunity to Learn” with A. Wade Boykin (ASCD, 2011), and “Invisible No More: Understanding and Responding to the Disenfranchisement of Latino Males” with A. Hurtado and E. Fergus (Routledge, 2011). Dr. Noguera appears as a regular commentator on educational issues on CNN, MSNBC, National Public Radio, and other national news outlets. From 2009 - 2012 he served as a Trustee for the State University of New York (SUNY) as an appointee of the Governor. He serves on the boards of numerous national and local organizations including the Economic Policy Institute, the Young Women’s Leadership Institute, The After School Corporation and The Nation Magazine. In 2013 he was appointed to the Kappa Delta Pi Honor Society and in 2014 he was appointed to the National Academy of Education. Dr. Noguera recently received awards from the Center for the Advanced Study of the Behavioral Sciences/Sage for outstanding achievement in advancing the understanding of the behavioral and social sciences as they are applied to pressing social issues, the National Association of Secondary Principals for distinguished service to the field of education, and from the McSilver Institute at NYU for his research and advocacy efforts aimed at fighting poverty.

Special Guest Speakers



Brian Van Brunt, Ed.D.

Dr. Brian Van Brunt joined The NCHERM Group (National Center for Higher Education Risk Management) as Senior Vice President for Professional Program Development. He is past-president of the American College Counseling Association (ACCA), the president-elect of the National Behavioral Intervention Team Association (NaBITA), and current president of the School and College Organization for Prevention Educators (SCOPE). Dr. Van Brunt has a doctoral degree in counseling supervision and education from the University of Sarasota/Argosy and a master's degree in counseling and psychological services from Salem State University. Dr. Van Brunt is a regular speaker for academic conferences around the world. He has presented hundreds of online training seminars and classes and has developed remote, asynchronous training modules on violence, mental health, and suicide prevention. He created a mental health crisis guide for study abroad advisors, and written textbook test banks and instructor guides for Pearson Education. Dr. Van Brunt has taught at a number of universities and colleges, and has offered classes in counseling theory, ethics, and sociology for both graduate and undergraduate students. He is the author of several books including "Ending Campus Violence: New Approaches in Prevention" and "A Faculty Guide to Addressing Disruptive and Dangerous Behavior in the Classroom." He is an expert on campus violence and has been interviewed by the New York Times, National Public Radio, LA Times, USA Today and has appeared on Headline News and Anderson Cooper 360.
