IV. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Election 2008

The November.4 elections yielded many positive results, including the re-election of Trustees Rob Rader, Susan Aminoff and Margaret Quinones-Perez, as well as passage of Measure AA, the \$295 million SMC bond measure. Statewide, Democrats gained a couple of seats in the state Legislature, but not enough to overcome the two-thirds vote required to pass a state budget. That two-thirds threshold has often resulted in long delays in passage of the state budget, affecting SMC. But Tsang said there is a move afoot to put on the statewide ballot a measure that would reduce from two-thirds to a simple majority the margin to pass a state budget.

Measure AA

Senior Director of Government Relations and Institutional Communications Don Girard reported that the passage of Measure AA by Santa Monica and Malibu voters demonstrated the community's "love for the college." He said many organizations and individuals deserve credit for its passage, including the Board, Associated Students, constituency groups on campus, the K-12 educational community, Santa Monica and Malibu city councils, and many more.

Enrollment

Academic Vice President Jeff Shimizu reported that fall 2008 enrollment is very strong – 6 percent higher than fall 2007 in full-time equivalent students and 7.5 percent in headcount. International student headcount is up 3 percent and out-of-state student enrollment is up by 10 percent from 2007. Also, enrollment for online courses is up 17 percent over a year ago.

"Any Line, "Any Time" Program

Project Manager for Sustainability Genevieve Bertone reported that early indications suggest that SMC's "Any Line, Any Time" program, which was started at the beginning of the fall semester and gives students and employees free rides on any Big Blue Bus, has had a significant impact on bus ridership. For example, Line 7, which runs along Pico Boulevard, experienced an 83 percent increase in passenger activity during peak school hours, compared to the same time a year ago. Line 6, which runs between the college and the Mar Vista-Palms area, had a whopping 147 percent increase.

SUBJECT: 2008-2009 QUARTERLY BUDGET REPORT/BUDGET OUTLOOK

<u>SUBMITTED BY:</u> Superintendent/President

<u>REPORT:</u> Fiscal Services Director Chris Bonvenuto reported that California Governor

Arnold Schwarzenegger's recent proposals to deal with the state's current budget crisis would have a "devastating" effect on California's community colleges. SMC is projecting, based on its most recent quarterly report, that the college would have an operating deficit of \$6.32 million for the current fiscal year. That would reduce its historically high reserve of \$18.79 million to \$12.47 million by June 30, 2009. However, if the governor's proposal were approved, the college would face an additional \$6 million in cuts for 2008-09, bringing the reserves to \$6.4 million at the end of the current fiscal year. Bonvenuto noted, however, that the Governor must still win approval of the state Legislature, which is currently meeting in an emergency session, and nobody knows what will happen. However, the college has begun a process to reduce expenditures - such as contract services, non-essential travel, equipment purchases, and the hiring of temporary personnel – in an effort to save an estimated \$1.5 million. In an earlier email to the college community, President Dr. Chui L. Tsang has said he believes the college "can weather this crisis if extraordinary care is given to safeguard the

reserve and prudent action is taken to trim our operating deficit."

<u>SUBJECT:</u> <u>STUDENT SERVICES/ADMINISTRATION BUILDING PROJECT</u>

SUBMITTED BY: Superintendent/President

<u>SUMMARY</u>:: The first phase is the demolition of the site's current buildings –

Amphitheater, Concert Hall and Music Building – and excavation of the underground parking garage. David Hart of Steinberg Architects gave a detailed overview of the project, a 100,000-square-foot building that will be the prominent entryway structure on campus. The futuristic, concrete-and-glass building has an unusual design with sustainable features. The three-story building would house all student services, the Welcome Center and Senior Administration, including the President's office. Demolition is scheduled to begin in January 2009, with

completion expected in 2013.

BACKGROUND: To bring final closure to the Hay Study the Personnel Commission evaluated the Classified Managers' compensation using Hay points, market comparables, and internal alignment. The Personnel Commission recommendations are listed below. In accordance with Merit Rule 12.1.4 and Education code 88087 the Personnel Commission shall present salary recommendations to the Board for approval.

At its regularly scheduled meeting of October 15, 2008, the Personnel Commission waived the "step to step" rules (Merit Rules 12.2.10 and 12.2.11) regarding salary on reclassification and reallocation to allow the District to implement these recommendations in a fiscally prudent manner. The Commission approved the District's proposal as follows:

Management employees whose positions were reclassified or reallocated to a higher range shall not automatically be placed on the new salary range on the same step which they held prior to the reclassification/reallocation but instead their new salary rate shall increase 5% but not less than the first step of the new salary range. In no event shall the salary rate exceed the maximum salary rate for the new range. Positions were reclassified effective January 1, 2007, however, to maintain consistency with the implementation of the Academic Managers' salaries on January 1, 2008, it is recommended that the new salary ranges become effective January 1, 2008, this shall become the new increment date and employees shall advance one step on the salary schedule upon completion of each year of continuous and satisfactory service until the maximum is reached.

For positions that were actually reclassified, meaning the titles and duties changed significantly, they would like to have the new range(s) effective January 1, 2007, rather than January 1, 2008. There appears to be only one position that falls into that category - the Technology Logistics Manager. That position prior to January 1, 2007 was an Assistant Computer Lab Supervisor

Comments on the Annual Report

- Architectural fees, which are ten percent of the construction cost of a project, have increased with the corresponding increase in constructions costs. In addition, sometimes there are additional costs for specialized services (i.e., audio visual). Architects are selected through an RFP (Request for Proposal) process with the Superintendent/President making the final recommendation to the Board of Trustees.
- The \$2.5 million payment to Malibu is for infrastructure improvements (waste water treatment) for the site at the Civic Center where a college educational site will be located as part of the agreement with Malibu in Measure S. The Measure S Bond Budget charts shows "not scheduled" only because there have been no payments yet for site acquisition and facility. In terms of the planning process, the District is active in the acquisition stage.

- In addition to Measure S funds, other funding sources for the Student Services Building will include interest income and possible refinance of current bond issues. The District has gone out to bid for the demolition portion of the project. The cost of the project will be re-evaluated and possibly adjusted based on current economic conditions.
- The District has been engaging with the City of Santa Monica on the Pico Promenade (improvements) project and the design of the Student Services Building.

As the District comes out of stabilization, we are projecting a decrease from the 2007-2008 base of 418.04 FTES in the 2008-2009 fiscal year. (This is related to Summer 2006 borrowing/Compton Instructional Services Agreement.) This decrease in FTES and the current outlook for the State and System budget in the 2008-2009 and 2009-2010 fiscal years (No COLA, possible deficit factor, possible Mid-vear Cuts, possible reductions in Prop 98 funds going forward) will require the District to draw down significantly on its reserves. Additionally the late adoption of the State budget coupled with the deferral of General Apportionment payments in January, February and March may cause the District serious cash flow issues that will require interfund borrowing and borrowing from the County Treasury resulting in a reduction in interest revenue from the 2007-2008 levels of \$568,000.
