IV. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Management Association

Management Association President Kiersten Elliott reported that the following managers received the newly created "Outstanding New Initiative/Community Builder" award, expected to be presented annually: Ron Furuyama and Maral Hyeler, Dual Enrollment Project Managers, and Katharine Muller, Dean of External Programs. The award is given for a contribution to fulfilling SMC's mission and/or enhancing SMC's sense of community (internally or externally) through exemplary or innovative programming or ideas.

Spring 2009– Enrollment

Vice President of Academic Affairs Jeff Shimizu reported that SMC has been experiencing very strong enrollment since summer 2008, attributable in part to the poor economy that traditionally sends people to college for job training or preparation for new careers. Shimizu said headcount and full-time equivalent student (FTEs) counts were up last summer, fall and the current winter session, and enrollment for spring, which begins in two weeks, is already ahead of what SMC had at the opening of spring 2008. Shimizu said many classes are already filled, particularly at high-demand periods in the morning and on the main campus. Demand for several small vocational programs has been so high that all their courses are closed already. Shimizu also said that because of the budget situation, the college will not be following its typical pattern of adding sections of classes in high-demand areas to replace cancelled course sections.

State Budget

There has been no movement in Sacramento to address the state budget crisis, but the college continues to work on finding ways to make savings in its own budget this fiscal year.

Expo Phase 2 Draft EIR

Officials reported in both written and verbal reports that the Exposition Metro Line Construction Authority released its Draft Environmental Impact Report for the Exposition Corridor Transit Project Phase 2, which would extend high-frequency transit service from the Westside of Los Angeles to Santa Monica, including a stop near SMC, at 17th Street either at Olympic Boulevard or Colorado Boulevard. The proposed project has been of keen interest to SMC because of its campaign to get students and employees to ride public transit.

SUBJECT: THE SMC PERFORMING ARTS CENTER

SUBMITTED BY: Superintendent/President

SUMMARY: Activities at SMC's Performing Arts Center

The Performing Arts Center, since its informal debut in August, has hosted widely varied productions and activities – from fundraisers to award shows, from photo shoots to concerts (both amplified and acoustic), from music to dance to Shakespeare, to screenings, lectures, and commercial film scoring. We've had our first wedding, and we've hosted Faculty Flex Day. We've had spoken word events, poets, dramatic readings, opera, master classes, baroque music, choirs, chamber orchestra and Chamber of Commerce and Convention and Visitors Bureau mixers. A reception in the Art Gallery for world famous playwright David Mamet culminated the Alistair Cook Memorial Lecture, presented at the Broad Stage and broadcast by the BBC to 60 million listeners worldwide. A successful fundraiser by Upward Bound expanded its local outreach, Madison Project hosted a spectacular inaugural gala with the incomparable Barbara Cook performing; and a community screening brought us the inauguration of the 44th President of the United States.

The music and dance departments perform repeatedly on the Eli and Edythe Broad Stage, which also serves both the SMC band and orchestra as a rehearsal hall. The innovative musical performance group Hiroshima headlines the Asian-Pacific Islander Celebration at the Broad Stage in May, sponsored by SMC Associates, which brought us Actors from the London Stage last fall.

The Edye expands its repertoire with virtually every genre of music represented. In addition to frequent Music Department performances, the Donna Sternberg Dancers perform in the spring, while the experiences of battered women are dramatized in a new play hosted by the Department of Social Sciences in February. The cutting edge Under the Radar series continues to set the standard for groundbreaking performances from Blues to Bollywood at this intimate local performance space.

Coordinating these myriad public and private activities and performances as well as Madison Project's impressive inaugural public season and arts education programming is the job of the SMC's Performing Arts Center administration and operations. From the time our Technical Director came on board in July, the pace has been at top speed with little time to catch our collective breath. We are now creating and implementing improvements to our business, administrative and operating systems, perfecting the tracking of billable and non-billed hours, to better assess our work and exercise greater control over technical labor costs.

We absorb the daily maintenance costs of performance and instructional programs with two full time custodians assigned to the campus. Custodial overtime for the theater is generally limited to a cost recovery basis and is paid for directly by private rentals and by the Madison Project to ensure that the facility remains a world-class venue.

As a result, despite a difficult economy, our cost neutral strategies enable us to earn enough to pay the full time costs of three technical staff, two custodians and some administrative overhead. Our focus on operation and administrative infrastructure improvements will help us address the following issues in the months ahead:

- Limiting cost of sales by focusing in on the most appropriate clients and markets, refining marketing and estimating forms and procedures.
- Working within more restrictive client budgets, communicating directly our understanding of client needs and the capabilities of the theater to meet those needs, leading to a more beneficial artistic collaboration and cost effective productions.
- Integrating special events with other areas on campus, reaching out to the community at large and advancing marketing strategies for areas where suitable.

At this time, our ability to continue operating in a cost neutral framework requires concentration of effort and proceeding with caution. If we are to benefit the educational mission and develop and promote new partnerships and programs, we must have the tools in place that support success. Our existing resources must be well understood and leveraged to the extent that they address community outreach, institutional support and enhancements to facilities and services.

AN UPDATE FROM THE MADISON PROJECT FOUNDATION

In this inaugural season of the Eli and Edythe Broad Stage, we have worked to establish the Broad Stage as the new "amazing space" on the Westside, a home for the world's best artists and for a community that loves the arts. The program offering includes a wide range of classical music from the Montreal Symphony to new music ensemble Jacaranda, exciting dance troupes including the acrobatic Diavolo and compelling new work by Helios Dance Theater, opera, jazz, Cajun and Creole music, and a traditional Irish band. Many performances, including Musica Angelica, KCRW Left Right and Center, and The Under the Radar Series at The Edye have sold out. Some concerts featured after parties where the audience gets to mingle and connect with the artists.

By season's end in May, the Madison Project will have presented 23 events in the main venue and 8 events at the smaller Edye Second Space. In addition, our arts education program, called Arts Insights, has served more than 1,000 families, students from a dozen local public K-12 schools and SMC students with master classes, interactive workshops, open rehearsals and free community performances. We are on target with our ticket sales and have achieved our membership goals for the current year. A new membership campaign will launch in March 2009.

Next season we plan to create opportunities to renew with an emphasis on multi-ticket purchases. By featuring series with several concerts, we intend to increase the return on our marketing investment. We will be doing retention programs for donors and members. Our season will expand cautiously to include a theatrical run, a jazz series, an international series, and a chamber music series, among many other diverse performances. We will again hold after parties in order to stimulate ticket sales to some of the more unusual concerts. We will announce our season the first week in March with season tickets to be sold starting in March through September.

On the financial side, expenses are at or under budget this season. Ticket sales are on target, and we have raised nearly \$150K of the fundraising goal of \$600K for this season. The Madison Project foundation has a remarkable and truly impressive board of directors, who are strongly committed to raising the remaining funds. We have also developed contingency plans should economic conditions hamper either our fundraising or ticket sales. On top of this, we have received the second payment on the \$10 million pledge from the Broad Foundation. While November and December were slow, our contributions and ticket sales have picked up noticeably in the new year.

A - ARTICLE 1200 ROLE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

BP 1230 Code of Ethics

Santa Monica College is committed to the principle that higher education should be available to every person who can benefit. Given this basic condition, the activities and deliberations of the Board of Trustees will be guided by this code of ethics.

The Board of Trustees:

- has as its basic function the establishment of the policies by which the District is to be administered.
- holds the Superintendent/President accountable for the administration of the educational program and the conduct of District business.
- is made up of individuals who will strive to work with fellow Board members in a spirit of harmony and cooperation even when values and beliefs are divergent.
- · is a unit of authority; Board members have no individual authority outside of official meetings.
- assures the orderly operation of the District by encouraging employees to make use of appropriate procedures before bringing their concerns to the Board.
- has the authority and responsibility to encourage the administration, faculty and staff to be original and creative in responding to the needs of the college community.

A Member of the Board of Trustees:

- · supports and assists in fostering the most effective relations between the college and the community.
- · never uses his/her position for material gain.
- Shall not use District funds, services, supplies or equipment to urge the passage or defeat of any ballot
 measure or candidate, including, but not limited to, any candidate for election to the Board of Trustees.
 Initiative or referendum measures may be drafted on an area of legitimate interest to the District. The Board
 may by resolution express the Board's position on ballot measures. Public resources may be used only for
 informational efforts regarding ballot measures.
- Shall not use or permit others to use public resources for personal purposes or any other purpose not authorized by law.
- devotes time, thought, and study for effective participation and contribution in the decision-making process of the Board.
- complies with pertinent laws and regulations that deliberations in closed session are confidential and not for public discussion or disclosure.
- makes decisions only after all facts have been presented and discussed. Statements or promises as to how one will vote prior to regular meetings are inappropriate.
- abides by majority decisions of the Board.
- participates in state and national community college trustees' associations and in educational conferences, workshops, and training sessions offered by local, state, and national organizations to enhance his/her potential as a Board member.

The Superintendent/President and Board Chair are authorized to consult with legal counsel when they become aware of or are informed about actual or perceived violations of pertinent laws and regulations, including but not limited to conflict of interest, open and public meetings, confidentiality of closed session information, and use of public resources. Violations of law may be referred to the District Attorney or Attorney General as provided for in law.

Violations of the Board's Code of Ethics will be addressed by the Chair of the Board, who will first discuss the violation with the trustee to reach a resolution. If resolution is not achieved and further action is deemed necessary, the Chair may appoint an ad hoc committee to examine the matter and recommend further courses of action to the Board. Sanctions may include a recommendation to the Board for censure of the trustee. If the Chair of the Board is perceived to have violated the code, the Board Vice-chair is authorized to pursue resolution.

A - ARTICLE 1400 STUDENT TRUSTEE

BP 1410 Qualifications

One student currently enrolled at the Santa Monica College shall be elected by the students to serve as Student Trustee. In order to serve as Student Trustee, he/she cannot hold an elected or appointed position as an Associated Students officer or director. The Student Trustee shall be seated with the Board and shall be recognized as a full member of the Board at meetings. The Student Trustee is entitled to participate in discussion of issues and receive all materials presented to members of the Board (except for closed session issues). The Student Trustee may have an advisory vote as authorized by the Board of Trustees on an annual basis.

The Student Trustee shall be a resident of California at the time of nomination and during the term of service, and shall be enrolled in and maintain a minimum of five semester units in the District at the time of nomination and throughout the term of service. The Student Trustee may be employed by the District. The Student Trustee shall maintain a minimum grade point average of C (2.0) throughout the term of service.

The election of the Student Trustee shall be in accordance with the procedures prescribed in the Associated Students Constitution. If the Student Trustee becomes ineligible, is recalled, cannot serve, or the position becomes vacant for reason(s) cited in Board Policy 1150 the Board of Trustees may request that the Associated Students Board of Directors conduct an election or open an application process to fill the vacancy.

The Student Trustee shall be subject to recall if a petition filed with the Superintendent/President is signed by ten percent (10%) of the students currently enrolled (spring or fall semesters only). The written petition will be submitted to the administrator responsible for Student Life for validation of signatures.

C - BP 1590 Recording of Meetings (New)

If the Board of Trustees authorizes any audio and/or video recording of a meeting, the recording shall be subject to inspection by members of the public in accordance with the California Public Records Act. The Superintendent/President shall ensure that any such recordings are maintained for at least thirty days following the taping or recording.

Persons attending an open and public meeting of the Board of Trustees may, at their own expense, record the proceedings, in the public seating area or an area approved in advance by the Board Chair, with an audio and/or video recording or a still photo camera or may broadcast the proceedings. However, if the Board finds by a majority vote that the recording or broadcast cannot continue without noise, illumination, or obstruction of view that constitutes or would constitute a persistent disruption of the proceedings, the Board Chair shall direct such person to cease such disruption.

D - ARTICLE 6100 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

BP 6116 Reporting Fraud, Waste or Abuse (New)

Santa Monica College is committed to the responsible stewardship of its resources and supports an internal appraisal function that includes the investigation of alleged fraud, irregularities, abuse, illegal acts and suspected misconduct of college employees. Managers, faculty, staff, students or interested citizens are encouraged to report known or suspected dishonest acts by employees, outside contractors or vendors.

Dishonest acts, either known or suspected, such as those listed below, should be reported:

- Theft or misappropriation of funds, supplies, property, or other college resources
- Forgery or alteration of documents
- Unauthorized alteration or manipulation of computer files
- Improper and/or wasteful activity
- Falsification of reports to management or external agencies
- Pursuit of a benefit or advantage in violation of the college's conflicts of interests policy
- Authorization or receipt of compensation for hours not worked

To facilitate the reporting of waste, fraud or abuse the District shall maintain an anonymous system for reporting with multiple reporting methods such as, but not limited to, telephone, website and mail.

Employees reporting suspected wrongdoing are protected under Federal and State law from retaliation by management and other employees.

Allegations are reviewed to determine the probability that the alleged act(s) could have occurred. This review will be conducted under the direction of the Executive Vice President and/or the Vice President of Human Resources, or their designee, and will include identification of losses, prevention of additional losses, application of appropriate personnel procedures, recovery of assets, and assistance with criminal investigation or prosecution. All reviews and investigations shall be conducted confidentially. An administrative regulation will include provisions for regular reporting to the Board of Trustees.

- Measure U Projects
 - The Campus Quad project is complete.
- Measure S Projects:
 - John Adams Middle School Field is complete.
 - Corsair Field is complete and the track is close to completion.
 - The new driveway at the Bundy is complete and the parking lot is open.
 - The Student Services Building, to be located on the northeast corner of the main campus is the largest in size, cost and impact on the campus in the college's history. Phase I of the project is underway with the demolition of three buildings, (Music, Concert Hall and Amphitheater) and excavation for the underground garage. Phase 2 is the construction of the underground parking garage and the Student Services Building. It is estimated that the three-level garage with approximately 500 spaces will be completed mid-2011. The front corner of the campus is blocked off, and replacement parking for staff is provided at the lot at Pico Blvd. and 14th Street.

Funding for the Student Services building is a combination of Measure S funds, State funds and other funding which most likely will be a Certificate of Participation (COP). A possible source of funds to pay the COP is the capital surcharge fees collected from international students, which generates about \$2 million per year. It will be possible to alternate phases of the construction to correspond with funding sources.

- Parking during construction: The college is down 40 parking spaces with the closure of Lot #I and the addition of Lot # 6 (14th and Pico). There is additional off-site parking at the Bundy campus and the shuttle lot on Stewart and Exposition. Further, the Big Blue Bus program is exceeding expectations which helps reduce demand for parking.
- Construction costs are declining which is resulting in projects coming in under budget because the budgets were based on previous costs. Many commercial companies in the western region who have not bid on public works projects will be actively pursuing some of these projects. Architecture fees which are typically ten percent of construction costs are also lower.
- The Malibu Joint Powers Authority (JPA) met in closed session to discuss the acquisition of real estate in the Malibu Civic Center area. The property is owned by the County of Los Angeles, but located in Malibu. \$25 million of Measure S funds are earmarked for Malibu.

Measure AA Projects

- There will be a presentation on the Facilities Master Plan at the next CBOC meeting. During the spring, a series of campus and community meetings will be held to start discussions about the Facilities Master Plan and Measure AA projects.
- The next project approved for state funding is Math/Science, which is dependent on \$40 million from the State.
- One of the projects will be the construction of an additional building and remodel of the existing building at the Academy of Entertainment and Technology to better serve the digital media instructional needs.

Bond Sales/Expenses Report: A recommendation to issue \$57 million of Measure bond funds will be presented to the Board of Trustees for approval at its meeting on February 2, 2009.

ADDENDUM B

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$57,000,000 OF SANTA MONICA COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS, 2004 ELECTION, 2009 SERIES C AND ORDERING CERTAIN ACTIONS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH

WHEREAS, the issuance of not to exceed \$135,000,000 aggregate principal amount of general obligation bonds (the "Authorization") of the Santa Monica Community College District (the "District"), County of Los Angeles (the "County"), State of California, was authorized at an election (the "Election") held in said District on November 2, 2004, the proceeds of which are to be used for the financing and refinancing of construction, equipping, furnishing and improvement of certain specified capital facilities of the District; and

WHEREAS, the Registrar-Recorder of the County has certified to the effect that the official canvass of returns for the Election reflected that more than fifty-five percent (55%) of the votes cast on the District's bond measure submitted to the voters at the Election (the "Measure") were cast in favor of the Measure, and such result has been entered in the minutes of this Board of Trustees (the "District Board"); and

WHEREAS, Section 15140(a) of the Education Code of the State of California authorizes the Board of Supervisors of the County (the "County Board") to borrow funds through the issuance of bonds in the name and on behalf of the District, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the District; and

WHEREAS, \$58,000,000 aggregate principal amount of general obligation bonds under the Authorization have heretofore been issued in a prior series of bonds by the County Board on behalf of the District, leaving unissued principal amount of \$77,000,000; and

WHEREAS, it now appears to this District Board that it is necessary and desirable for the issuance and sale of not to exceed \$57,000,000 in one or more series of bonds of the Authorization to be used for the financing of the acquisition, construction, equipping, furnishing and improvement of certain capital facilities as permitted in the official Project List of the District approved at the Election; and

WHEREAS, this District Board hereby determines that such bonds should be offered at this time, in one or more series, and requests the County Board to offer such bonds for sale;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Santa Monica Community College District as follows:

This District Board hereby determines that general obligation bonds of the District in the aggregate principal or issue amount of not to exceed \$57,000,000 (the "Bonds") be offered for sale, in one or more series, the proceeds of which are to be used for financing the acquisition, construction, equipping, furnishing and improvement of certain capital facilities of the District as permitted in the official Project List of the District approved at the Election.

For the above purposes, this District Board hereby requests the County Board to issue the Bonds and to order such Bonds to be sold to RBC Capital Markets Corporation, as the Underwriter, at a negotiated sale in accordance with a Contract of Purchase to be prepared and entered into by and among the District, the County and the Underwriter in connection with the sale of the Bonds, substantially in the form submitted to and considered by this Board (the "Contract of Purchase"). The Bonds shall bear or accrete interest at rates not to exceed the maximum rate per annum permitted by law and shall not exceed 25 years in maturity from their date of issuance. The form of Contract of Purchase on file with the District Board is hereby approved and the Superintendent/President of the District, its Executive Vice President or any designee of either thereof (each, an "Authorized Officer,") and each of them is hereby authorized to execute the Contract of Purchase, with such changes therein, deletions therefrom and modifications thereto as such Authorized Officer may approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof. The District has instructed the Underwriter to establish the terms, series, interest structure and redemption provisions for the Bonds in order to take advantage of financial market conditions prevailing at the date of sale of the Bonds under the Contract of Purchase. Depending upon market conditions, the District may elect to purchase bond insurance to secure the payment of principal of and interest on or accreted value of the Bonds, or any portion thereof.

The District Board hereby approves the use by the Underwriter of a Preliminary Official Statement relating to the Bonds, substantially in the form submitted to and considered by this District Board (the "Preliminary Official Statement") and following pricing, an Official Statement in connection with the sale of the Bonds (the "Official Statement"), in each case with such changes as may be approved by the Authorized Officer and such other officers of the District as may be authorized by the District Board are, and each of them acting alone hereby is, authorized to deliver copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and the Official Statement with such changes therein as such Authorized Officer shall approve, in his or her discretion, as being in the best interests of the District. Upon the approval of such changes by such Authorized Officer, the Preliminary Official Statement shall be "deemed final" as of its date except for the omission of certain information as provided in and pursuant to Rule 15c2-12 promulgated under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended (the "Rule"). The Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed to execute such Official Statement with such changes therein, deletions therefrom and modifications thereto as such Authorized Officer may approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof.

The Bonds shall be issued in book-entry only form, to be lodged with The Depository Trust Company ("DTC") in New York, New York, which shall be the registered owner of the Bonds issued at the closing in the form of a single certificated Bond for each maturity within a series of the Bonds described in the Contract of Purchase. The Underwriter is directed to assist the District and the County in qualifying the Bonds for deposit with DTC.

Pursuant to the California Education Code, the Treasurer and Tax Collector of the County (the "Treasurer") shall serve as the initial paying agent (the "Paying Agent") for the Bonds. Subject to the consent of the County, the Authorized Officer shall appoint U.S. Bank National Association, as agent of the Paying Agent. The first annual fees for Paying Agent services shall be paid from proceeds of the Bonds; subsequent annual fees shall be paid by the District.

The District Board hereby confirms the designation of RBC Capital Markets Corporation, as Underwriter and the law firm of Fulbright & Jaworski L.L.P., Los Angeles, California, as Bond Counsel to the District in connection with the authorization and issuance of the Bonds.

The District hereby covenants that it shall not, directly or indirectly, use or permit the use of any proceeds of any of the Bonds, or of any of the property financed or refinanced with the proceeds of the Bonds, or other funds of the District, or take or omit to take any action that would cause the Bonds to be deemed "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"). To that end, the District shall comply with all requirements of Section 148 of the Code and all regulations of the United States Department of the Treasury promulgated thereunder to the extent that such requirements are in effect and applicable to the Bonds.

Pursuant to Section 15146(b) of the Education Code, the District Board hereby approves of the sale of the Bonds on a negotiated basis to the Underwriter. The District has determined that conditions in the municipal marketplace are sufficiently complex that the increased flexibility the Underwriter can provide in structuring and planning the sale of the Bonds dictates sale on a negotiated rather than a competitive basis. The costs of sale of the Bonds, which include Bond Counsel fees, printing and rating charges, Paying Agent and dissemination agent fees, municipal data collection and other related fees, are estimated at no more than 0.35% of the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds. The cost of bond insurance premium, if any, is estimated at no more than 0.60% of the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds. The purchase price of the Bonds shall reflect an Underwriter's discount of not to exceed 1.0% of the principal amount thereof.

The District Board determines that all acts and conditions necessary to be performed by the District Board or to have been met precedent to and in the issuing and sale of the Bonds in order to make them the legal, valid and binding general obligations of the District have been performed and have been met, or will at the time of delivery of the Bonds have been performed and met, in regular and due form as required by law; and that no statutory or Constitutional limitation of indebtedness or taxation will have been exceeded in the issuance of the Bonds.

The form of Continuing Disclosure Undertaking on file with the District Board prepared in connection with the Bonds and to be dated the date of sale of the Bonds, for the benefit of the registered owners from time to time of the Bonds (the "Owners") is hereby approved and the District Board hereby authorizes the Authorized Officer to execute such Continuing Disclosure Undertaking with such changes therein as may be approved by the Authorized Officer. The District hereby covenants and agrees that it will comply with and carry out all of the provisions of such Continuing Disclosure Undertaking in order to assist the Underwriter to comply with the requirements of the Rule. Any Owner may take such actions as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking mandamus or specific performance by court order, to cause the District to comply with its obligations under this Section; however, noncompliance with this Section shall not constitute a default under or cause the acceleration of the Bonds.

Should the Authorized Officer, upon consultation and advice of the Underwriter, determine it is in the best interests of the District to obtain credit enhancement for the Bonds, including municipal bond insurance, to improve their marketability, the Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed to sign documents to secure such credit enhancement on such terms and subject to such conditions as may be established by the Authorized Officer, in agreements relating to such credit enhancement.

The County Board is hereby requested to assist the District in the issuance and sale of the Bonds; in order to meet the requirements of law and the procedures of the County with respect to such a request, the Clerk of the District Board is hereby directed to lodge a certified copy of this Resolution with the Clerk of the County Board and with the Superintendent of Schools of the County promptly following adoption hereof, and the District represents and warrants to the County that annual administrative expenses associated with the Bonds at the time outstanding shall be the sole responsibility of the District and the District shall reimburse the County's costs and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds. The Bonds are the general obligations of the District secured by tax levies and do not constitute an obligation of the County except as set forth in the resolution to be adopted by the County Board authorizing the issuance of the Bonds. The County will bear no responsibility for the acquisition, construction or installation of the project, or any part thereof.

Members of the District Board and District officials and staff, their authorized deputies and designees, are hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things and to execute and deliver any and all documents which they may deem necessary or advisable in order to proceed with the issuance of the Bonds and otherwise carry out, give effect to and comply with the terms and intent of this Resolution. Such actions as may have heretofore been taken by such officers, officials and staff are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
