 section in the agenda.
- Five minutes is allotted to each speaker per topic for general public comments or per item in the Consent Agenda. The speaker must adhere to the topic. Individuals wishing to speak during Public Comments or on a specific item on the Consent Agenda will be called upon during Public Comments.

Major Items of Business

- The card to speak during Major Items of Business must be submitted to the recording secretary at the meeting **before** the Board reaches that specific item in the Major Items of Business in the agenda.
- Five minutes is allotted to each speaker per item in Major Items of Business. The speaker must adhere to the topic. Individuals wishing to speak on a specific item in Major Items of Business will be called upon at the time that the Board reaches that item in the agenda.
- 2. No uncivil or disorderly conduct shall be permitted at any Board of Trustees meeting. Persistence in displaying such conduct shall be grounds for summary termination and/or removal of the person from the meeting by the Chair.
- 3. No oral presentation shall include charges or complaints against any employee of the District, regardless of whether or not the employee is identified in the presentation by name or by another reference which tends to identify the individual. Charges or complaints against employees shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees under provisions of Board Policy Section 9421. Any employee against whom charges or complaints are to be made must be given 24 hours advanced notice and may request any such charges or complaints are heard in closed session.
- 4. Exceptions: This policy does not apply to individuals who address the Board at the invitation or request of the Board or the Superintendent.

Payment rate will be consistent with the California Department of Education/Child Development Division maximum reimbursement rate. A list of providers will be on file in the office of the Director of Child Care Services, and the Market Ceiling Rate Chart.

Comment:

The college established a CalWORKS program with the goal of assisting TANF/AFDC students in their transition from welfare to work and the Pico Partnership Program to assist the population of highly at-risk students residing in close proximity to the college and/or those who have attended local high schools. A large component of these programs is assisting those students in finding quality child care. The Director of Child Care Services will continue to facilitate this process through the development of a licensed child care provider data base and a voucher system implemented for the purpose of payment for child care services.

6-C SANTA MONICA PRESCHOOL COLLABORATIVE

Agreement between Easter Seals Southern California, Santa Monica Community College District, and Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District to form the Santa Monica Preschool Collaborative, which will provide child care and development services to approximately 125 Santa Monica area children (including children of Santa Monica College students) under the age of five. Santa Monica College will be responsible for underwriting the Collaborative's actual expenses to a limit of \$100,000 annually and providing the services of the two pre-school teachers currently employed by SMC. Should the pre-school teachers terminate employment with SMC, the College will cover the cost of their replacement by Easter Seals.

The Collaborative will deliver services at three sites: John Adams Child Development Center (2320 17th Street), Lincoln Child Development Center (1532 California Avenue), and the SMC/Assistance League Child Development Center (1441 15th Street). The Adams and Lincoln sites are provided by the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District; the Assistance League site is provided by Santa Monica College. Easter Seals will be the operational agent, responsible for staffing, management, oversight, licensing, and contract compliance with the State Department of Education funding terms and conditions. Easter Seals will also work with SMC to establish the Collaborative preschools as work/study sites to inspire SMC students to enter the early childhood education field through a positive work experience.

That the employer's contribution for each employee who is a member of and each annuitant who retired from employment which would be covered by the above identified recognized employee organization enrolled in PERS health benefits plans shall be as follows:

\$378.70 per month tenthly (\$315.59 per month twelfthly), effective August 1, 2002

and that the contribution shall be in addition to those amounts contributed by the Public Agency for administrative fees and to the Contingency Reserve Fund.

Because Santa Monica College has historically been a low revenue district, and because community colleges have not been funded at a rate which would keep pace with the growth and price inflator factors found in the Gann Limit, the appropriation amount is significantly below the Gann Limit.

TENTATIVE BUDGET NARRATIVE

The 2002-2003 Tentative Budget presentation consists of three parts: the 2001-2002 Adopted Budget; Projected Revenues and Expenditures for fiscal year 2001-2002 and the proposed Tentative Budget for 2002-2003. The Tentative Budget is approved in June prior to the beginning of the 2002-2003 fiscal year to authorize the District to pay expenses incurred before to the adoption of the budget on September 9, 2002.

2001-2002 Adopted Budget

This column is for reference only. It reflects the budget that was adopted in September 2001. Please remember budget augmentations, decreases and transfers have changed these numbers throughout the year.

2001-2002 Projected Actuals

The projected apportionment revenues for 2001-2002 are based on the first principal apportionment calculation received from the Chancellor's Office in February 2002. Growth revenues are based on the Chancellor's Office estimate of May 21, 2002 and are included in the apportionment figure. Actual revenues at year-end may be different because they will reflect the second principal apportionment calculation, which we will receive in early July. The final revision to 2001-2002 income will not be received until February 2003. Projected revenues are based on actual receipts through May 16, 2002, plus a projection of anticipated revenues during the last six weeks of the fiscal year.

The expenditure projections include all raises given during the 2001-2002 fiscal year. Expenditure projections are based on actual expenditures and encumbrances through May 16, 2002, plus a projection of anticipated expenditures through June 30, 2002.

The 2001-2002 projections reflect reserves (an ending balance) of \$366,088. The prior year adjustment to apportionment and the under-funded growth caused by the State's deficit in growth funds account for \$3.5 million of the reduction in reserves.

2002-2003 Tentative Budget

Revenue projections for the 2002-2003 Tentative Budget reflect the Governor's Budget May Revise. Included is a 2% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) and a 3% growth. All ongoing State revenues have been budgeted at the same amount as received in 2001-02. The Governor's May Revise does not provide for any additional funding or COLA for Partnership for Excellence and the Part-Time Hourly Pay Increase. It reduces CalWORKS, TTIP, TANF, Staff Diversity and Staff Development.

Other revenue projections for 2002-2003 reflect 2001-2002 projected actuals with the exception of parking fines which have been reduced to the 1992-93 revenue base due to more parking spaces being restored.

The expenditure projections reflect a slight net savings from the hiring of five (5) new faculty positions and 5 ½ faculty separations. A 2% COLA has been included for all academic salaries except on the part-time instructor adjustment and academic managers. All managers and classified staff salaries reflect a 2% COLA effective January 1, 2003. Appropriate step,

column and longevity increases have been included for all employees. Health and Welfare Benefits have increased by 25%, Utilities by 8% and Postage by 10%. STRS contributions have increased to cover summer, winter and overload compensation as required under AB 2700. PERS contributions have been reinstated for 2002-2003 at a rate of 2.894% and a new PERS Safety Retirement Plan college police has been implemented at the approximate cost of \$315,277 per year.

The District's general fund budget is out of balance by over \$8.1 million. In order to have a balanced Tentative Budget adjustments have been inserted as negative budget figures. Over the next few months budget cuts will be made so that the Adopted Budget for 2002-03 will be in balance without using negative budget figures.

The Restricted General Fund reflects those grants that are on going. The major decreases are due to the Governor's reduction in normally on-going programs such as Staff Development, Staff Diversity, Instructional Equipment, CalWORKS and Matriculation. As in past years, the Restricted General Fund Budget may be increased as new grants are received and accepted.

In addition to the General Funds, the District's Tentative Budget also includes funds for financial aid and capital projects. These funds are not available to be transferred to the General Fund to help solve the operating budget deficit. This means the District will be expending millions of dollars to acquire facilities, build and remodel buildings, and modernizing areas of the College at the same time the operating budget is being cut by over \$8 million. Just like the rest of the state agencies, Santa Monica College will be sharing in the state's budget crisis. However, because of the foresight of the Board and the local voters, the College will be recreating itself to emerge as a modern and better facility when the budget crisis is over.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$25,000,000 OF SANTA MONICA COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS, 2002 ELECTION, SERIES A

WHEREAS, the issuance of not to exceed \$160,000,000 aggregate principal amount of general obligation bonds (the "Authorization") of the Santa Monica Community College District (the "District"), County of Los Angeles (the "County"), State of California, was authorized at an election (the "Election") held in said District on March 5, 2002, the proceeds of which are to be used for the acquisition, construction, improvement, equipping and furnishing of various capital facilities of the District; and

WHEREAS, the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk of the County has certified to the effect that the official canvass of returns for the Election reflected that more than 55% of the votes cast on the District's bond measure submitted to the voters at the Election (the "Measure") were cast in favor of the Measure, and such result has been entered in the minutes of this Board of Trustees of the District (the "District Board"); and

WHEREAS, all of the Authorization remains unsold; and

WHEREAS, Section 15140 of the Education Code of the State of California authorizes the Board of Supervisors of the County (the "County Board") to borrow funds through the issuance of bonds in the name and on behalf of the District, or, as an alternative, as authorized pursuant to Section 53506 et seq. of the California Government Code, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the District; and

WHEREAS, it now appears to this District Board that financial market conditions are favorable for the issuance and sale of not to exceed \$25,000,000 of the Authorization to be used for the acquisition, construction, improvement, equipping and furnishing of certain capital facilities of the District; and

WHEREAS, the District Board hereby determines that such bonds should be offered at this time, in one or more series, and requests the County Board to offer such bonds for sale; and

WHEREAS, the District Board has previously retained RBC Dain Rauscher Inc. as its Underwriter (the "Underwriter") and Fulbright & Jaworski L.L.P. as its Bond Counsel ("Bond Counsel") in connection with the issuance of such bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of Santa Monica Community College District, as follows:

Section 1. This District Board hereby determines that general obligation bonds of the District in the aggregate principal or issue amount of not to exceed \$25,000,000 be offered for sale, in one or more series (the "Bonds"), as more particularly described in Section 2 below, the proceeds of which are to be used for the acquisition or construction of improvements to real property of the District, as set forth in the bond proposition approved at the Election.

Section 2. For the above purposes, this District Board hereby requests the County Board to issue the Bonds and to order such Bonds to be sold to the Underwriter at a negotiated sale in accordance with a Purchase Contract to be prepared and entered into by and among the District, the County and the Underwriter in connection with the sale of the Bonds (the "Purchase Contract"). The Bonds shall be dated July 1, 2002 (or such other date as may be designated in the Purchase Contract), to bear or accrete interest at rates not to exceed 8.0% per annum, payable with respect to any Bonds bearing current interest on the dates as may be set forth in the Purchase Contract, and accreting with respect to any Bonds which are issued as capital appreciation bonds, payable upon maturity or conversion, shall mature on July 1 of each of the years as set forth in the Purchase Contract, through a date no later than July 1, 2027, or otherwise upon such other terms and conditions as shall be established for the Bonds by the Purchase Contract. The form of Purchase Contract on file with the District Board is hereby approved and the Superintendent/President of the District (the "President"), the Vice President/Business and Administration of the District (the "Vice President"), or any designee thereof (each, an "Authorized Officer"), and each of them is hereby authorized to execute the Purchase Contract, with such changes therein, deletions therefrom and modifications thereto as such Authorized Officer may approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof. The District has instructed the Underwriter to establish the terms, series, interest structure and redemption provisions for the Bonds in order to take advantage of financial market conditions prevailing at the date of sale of the Bonds under the Purchase Contract. Depending upon market conditions, the District may elect to purchase bond insurance to secure the payment of principal of and interest on or accreted value of the Bonds, or one series thereof, following consultation with the Treasurer and Tax Collector of the County (the "Treasurer").

Section 3. The District Board hereby approves the form of Preliminary Official Statement relating to the Bonds on file with the Secretary of the District Board and to be used and distributed, together with an Official Statement in connection with the sale of the Bonds, in each case with such changes as are approved by the Authorized Officer, and the Authorized Officer, and such other officers of the District as may be authorized by the District Board are, and each of them acting alone hereby is, authorized to deliver copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and the Official Statement with such changes therein as such officer shall approve, in his or her discretion, as being in the best interests of the District. Upon approval of such changes by such officer, the Preliminary Official Statement shall be "deemed final" as of its date except for the omission of certain information as provided in and pursuant to Rule 15c2-12 promulgated under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). An Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed to execute such Official Statement with such changes therein, deletions therefrom and modifications thereto as such Authorized Officer may approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof.

Section 4. The Bonds shall be issued in book-entry only form, to be lodged with The Depository Trust Company ("DTC") in New York, New York, which shall be the registered owner of the Bonds issued at the closing in the form of a single certificated Bond for each maturity within a series of the Bonds described in the Purchase Contract. The Underwriter is directed to assist the District and the County in qualifying the Bonds for deposit with DTC.

Section 5. Unless the Treasurer shall appoint a commercial bank as paying agent in connection with the closing of the Bonds, the Treasurer shall serve as Paying Agent for the Bonds, the first annual fees for which shall be paid from proceeds of the Bonds; subsequent annual fees shall be paid from the general fund of the District. The District Board hereby authorizes the Authorized Officer to execute a paying agent agreement, if required, for and on behalf of the District.

Section 6. The District hereby covenants that it shall not, directly or indirectly, use or permit the use of any proceeds of any of the Bonds, or of any of the property financed or refinanced with the proceeds of the Bonds, or other funds of the District, or take or omit to take any action that would cause the Bonds to be deemed "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"). To that end, the District shall comply with all requirements of Section 148 of the Code and all regulations of the United States Department of the Treasury promulgated thereunder to the extent that such requirements are in effect and applicable to the Bonds.

Section 7. The District covenants to comply with all the procedures and provisions set forth in the Arbitrage and Use of Proceeds Certificate, and will do and perform all acts and things necessary in order to assure that interest paid on the Bonds shall be excluded from gross income of the owners thereof for purposes of federal income taxation.

Section 8. The District Board determines that all acts and conditions necessary to be performed by the District Board or to have been met precedent to and in the issuing and sale of the Bonds in order to make them the legal, valid and binding general obligations of the District have been performed and have been met, or will at the time of delivery of the Bonds have been performed and met, in regular and due form as required by law; that the full faith, credit and revenues of the District are hereby pledged for the timely payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds; and that no statutory or Constitutional limitation of indebtedness or taxation will have been exceeded in the issuance of the Bonds.

Section 9. The form of Continuing Disclosure Agreement on file with the District Board prepared in connection with the Bonds and to be dated the date of sale of the Bonds, for the benefit of the registered owners from time to time of the Bonds (the "Owners") is hereby approved and the District Board hereby authorizes the Authorized Officer to execute such Continuing Disclosure Agreement with such changes therein as may be approved by the Authorized Officer. The District hereby covenants and agrees that it will comply with and carry out all of the provisions of such Continuing Disclosure Agreement in order to assist the Underwriter to comply with the requirements of the Rule. Any registered owner of Bonds may take such actions as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking mandamus or specific performance by court order, to cause the District to comply with its obligations under this Section; however, noncompliance with this Section shall not constitute a default under or cause the acceleration of the Bonds.

Section 10. Should the Authorized Officer, upon consultation with and advice of the Underwriter, determine it is in the best interests of the District to obtain credit enhancement for the Bonds, including municipal bond insurance, to improve their marketability, the Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed to sign documents to secure such credit enhancement on such terms and subject to such conditions as may be established by the Authorized Officer, in agreements relating to such credit enhancement.

Section 11. The County Board is hereby requested to assist the District in the issuance and sale of the Bonds; in order to meet the requirements of law and the procedures of the County with respect to such a request, the Clerk of the District Board is hereby directed to lodge a certified copy of this Resolution with the Clerk of the County Board and with the Superintendent of Schools of the County promptly following adoption hereof, and the District represents and warrants to the County that the District shall reimburse the County's costs and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds. The Bonds will be the general obligations of the District and will not constitute an obligation of the County except as set forth in the resolution to be adopted by the County Board authorizing the issuance of the Bonds.

Section 12. Officers of the District Board and District officials and staff are hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things and to execute and deliver any and all documents which they may deem necessary or advisable in order to proceed with the issuance of the Bonds and otherwise carry out, give effect to and comply with the terms and intent of this Resolution. Such actions as may have heretofore been taken by such officers, officials and staff are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

Section 13. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
